

ACCREDITATION & ASSOCIATIONS











Tabor College is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools (30 North LaSalle Street, Suite 2400, Chicago, IL 60602, Phone: 800-621-7440) and is approved to offer training under the Veterans Educational Training Program.

The College holds membership in the ACCK (Associated Colleges of Kansas,) the KCAC (Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference), the KICA (Kansas Independent College Association,) the Council of Mennonite Colleges, and the CCCU (Council for Christian Colleges and Universities. In addition, Tabor College holds private accreditations in Athletic Training, Education, Music and Nursing. Students who complete the social work major are eligible to be licensed at the Licensed Bachelor of Social Work level.

TABOR COLLEGE HILLSBORO

The Hillsboro campus serves mainly traditional-aged students and is located in Hillsboro, Kansas (population approximately 3,500), an agricultural area 50 miles north of Wichita, the largest city in Kansas. The campus consists of 43 buildings, located on an 86.5 acre tract in the southeast part of Hillsboro. Recent projects include the construction of the Solomon L. Loewen Natural Science Center, Dakota Hall, Hiebert Hall, Loewen Hall, and Wiebe Hall, a strength-training facility addition to the Campus Recreation Center, a locker room, and the Joel Wiens Stadium. Plans are in place to begin construction of the Shari Flaming Center for the Arts, a component of the \$16.2M dollar Signature Campaign which began in 2012. Funding for the project has reached \$7.5m of the \$8.0m which must be raised before the Mabee Foundation gift of \$1.0m is added, a gift which will bring the total to \$9.0m.

Tabor College's Hillsboro campus is the original site of Tabor College, where the Tabor College Corporation owned and operated it until 1934, when ownership was transferred to the Board of Trustees of the Conference of the Mennonite Brethren Church of North America. The college now operates under its own charter with its Board of Directors responsible to the Mennonite Brethren churches of the Central, Southern, Latin America and North Carolina Districts.

TABOR COLLEGE WICHITA

Tabor College School of Adult and Graduate Studies is located in the northwest portion of Wichita and is easily accessible from all directions, including Interstate 235 and Highway 96. Our facilities in Wichita feature three large classrooms with state-of-the-art technology as well as administrative offices, which house key services for adult and graduate students. Also housed in this location are offices of the District Minister for the Southern District of the Mennonite Brethren Church and of the Mennonite Brethren Missions and Services International.

Tabor College School of Adult and Graduate studies began in Wichita in 1993. AGS utilizes online, on campus, and ITV formats. There are bachelor's degree programs in Business, Christian Ministry, and Nursing (RN-BSN). A Master of Business Administration (MBA) is offered with a concentration in Leadership Management, as well as an MA in Entrepreneurial Ministry Leadership. The Adult and Graduate programs include an AA in Urban Ministry, summer online courses, and STEPS (Studies that Enhance Program Success,) a pre-degree completion program that allows working adults to earn lower-level general education hours in an accelerated format.





HOME STATES & COUNTRIES OF TABOR COLLEGE HILLSBORO STUDENTS









- World Impact benefits from students serving in WUMP, Wichita Urban Ministry Plunge, an outreach seeking to present Christ to inner-city children.
- Tabor College students also mentor elementary students in the school system in Hillsboro. A Tabor College donor provides a stipend for those who are involved in CHUMS, but the program is not monetarily driven.
- Many other opportunities present themselves regularly.

Presidential Leadership Program

The Presidential Leadership Program is for students who have the potential to make lasting contributions to Tabor College student campus life, who excel in the classroom and who have the passion and desire to make a positive difference in the world.

Program Mission:

To prepare people to be persons of influence, learning how to lead and lead well, influencing the world to be more as God intended it to be.

Program Vision:

To create a leadership learning community that provides experiences, networking, exposures, mentoring, and leadership readings for today's young leaders.

The Presidential Leadership Program creates a learning community around leadership and provides leadership exposure for its participants. It currently has two tracks - Scholars and Fellows. The program is a four-year, eight-semester program. The world is our classroom.

The Scholars track...

consists of eight leadership courses that students enroll in during the four years. The students will be together in all the classes. Prerequisite for participation in the Presidential Leadership Program as a scholar is to be selected as a "leadership scholar." Four new freshmen scholars are admitted to the program each school year, yielding 16 total scholars at Tabor.

The Fellows track...

consists of mentoring and leadership exposure experiences. Experiences, networking, exposure, reading, and mentoring are hallmarks of the program. The *Being/Doing* model of leadership is taught and caught. Prerequisite for participation in the Presidential Leadership Program as a fellow is to be selected as a "leadership fellow."







The average price for tuition and fees at public four-year colleges was \$8,893 for in-state students in 2013-14, up from \$8,646 in 2012-13, a 2.9-percent increase. At private four-year colleges, published tuition and fees rose from \$28,989 in 2012-13 to \$30,094 in 2013-14, a 3.8-percent increase.

"Full-time, in-state undergraduates paid an average of \$3,120 (+7.2%) after grant aid and tax benefits at public four-year institutions in 2013-14. Students at private, nonprofit four-year institutions paid an average net price of \$12,460 (-6.9%). In 2012-13 the net price was \$2,910 at four-year public colleges and \$13,380 at four-year private nonprofit colleges. (The College Board defines net price by looking at the average price paid by all full-time undergraduates, on financial aid or not, after grants and federal tax benefits are taken into account.)"
