

**TABOR COLLEGE**  
**ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM**  
**(AP)**

**Objective**

The Advanced Placement Program is a cooperative educational endeavor based on the observed fact that many young people can complete college-level studies while they are still in secondary school, and on the desire of their schools and colleges, together, to foster these experiences at schools and their proper recognition at college. The Advanced Placement Examinations are offered annually to give high school students opportunities to demonstrate college-level achievement. Students who have not studied extensively beyond the normal secondary school level are therefore not advised to take them. At the same time, Advanced Placement, like other College Board programs, is open to all who think that it will serve their educations. Tabor College believes that those deserving credit should receive it and therefore has established a policy that rewards and encourages self-motivated learning.

**Cost and Registration**

Information about the cost of AP examinations is available from high schools who offer the examinations. Tabor does not charge any additional fee for granting the credit. Each year, in May, the examinations are given by schools throughout the world. Most students take the examinations in their own schools; others take them in multi-school centers. **Granting of Credit**

The maximum amount of credit by examination which may be applied to the 120 semester hours required for the completion of a Bachelor's Degree is 30 hours. Credit by AP exam will be graded "Credit" and will not be computed into the student's GPA.

AP credit will be identified on the transcript as credit received through Advanced Placement.

AP exams may not be used to replace grades earned in residence. A course may be repeated only by re-enrolling and completing a Tabor resident course or by taking an institutional challenge exam.

Students need to submit a copy of their score reports so they can be evaluated according to Tabor's AP policy for both the minimum score and the amount of credit given.
